### **Historic Graduation: First BSBAA Graduates Fall 2023**



In Fall 2022, the college debuted its very first Baccalaureate Program, called, in full, the **Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with an emphasis in Accounting program (BSBAA)**. The program consists of 56 credit hours distributed amongst 18 courses, of which, 11 are 300-level courses, and the rest 400-level.

With this exciting addition to the College's roster of programs, students were eager to jump into enrollment right after earning their Associate of Science in Business Administration. With proper advertising and word-of-mouth promotional measures, not only continuing students enrolled into the new program, but former graduates who were informed and interested returned to further polish their credentials.

It is a statement containing no hyperbole to say that enrollment was a huge success! The courses offered under the program frequently exceeded the enrollment cap of 25 students. This showed the excellent progress of enrollment; however, it also translated into overloads for the instructors. Nonetheless, these self-sacrificing instructors were willing to take in more work to help these students progress in their studies, exemplifying the "student-centeredness" aspect of the College's mission statement.

And in the latter part of the Fall 2023 semester, the product of hard-working students, experienced mentors, and a supportive institution was clear. In COM-FSM's 78th commencement exercises, a whopping 28 students of the BSBAA program graduated, 4 with the status of Summa cum Laude, 2 Magna cum Laude, and 1 cum Laude, which is a first in the College's history, and a tremendous improvement from the previous semester. All 28 graduates are pictured above, and the College hopes to one day witness again this magnitude of achievement.

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### **Strengthening Faculty**



#### 🕍 Novel Share-A-Dish Day Piloted

On the 9th of February, the Instructional Affairs Department debuted its first Share-A-Dish Day, where faculty and administrative staff meet to share a meal and discuss recent issues, developments, and ideas.

The Dean of Academic Programs, Kasiano Paul, opened the occasion with welcoming remarks and encouraged the faculty to share anything

and everything they saw fit to discuss. National Campus Instructional Coordinator, Joseph Felix Jr., shared the Fall 2023 Course-Level Assessment Results for National Campus. stating that over 140 of the 186 sections offered were already assessed. The Vice President



for Instructional Affairs, Delihna Ehmes, shared new changes to enrollment procedures, where a Placement Test would be used rather than an Entrance Test in order to accommodate the recent decline in enrollment. The faculty commented on the matter and shared personal teaching experiences, touching on both their weaknesses and strengths.

Briefly, before the conclusion of the event, the VPIA thanked the faculty, and expressed her excitement for future 'dish-sharing' (both verbal and actual meals), where she coined the name Share-A-Dish. Set on the first Friday of each month, the Education Division members will host the next event.



#### IWCE Conference and Workshop

As told by Professor **Nelchor Permitez**, Ed. D: "During the conference (Day 1 & 2), I gained insights into the latest telecommunication technologies such as wireless, cyber security, and distributed antenna systems. Speakers focused on both marketing their products and



showcasing emerging industry technologies. At the ETA FOI workshop, we delved into fiber optic theory, standards, and codes. Following instruction and assessment from Light Brigade (Training provider by ETA), I passed the assessment. In the workshop's later days (Day 3 & 4), we

engaged in hands-on activities with tools for fiber optic cutting, splicing, troubleshooting, and repair. ETA FOI certification required passing a 75-question exam ... To my relief, I scored a perfect 75/75, maintaining COM-FSM's reputation. One valuable addition from the conference and workshop that



enhances our instructional toolkit, supporting continuous improvement and best practices, is the incorporation of holographic technology. Similar to what's seen in movies like Avatar and Iron Man, three-dimensional images and videos can now be utilized during lectures and demonstrations to reinforce learning. We've introduced the use of a teacher's table camera, seamlessly connecting small materials, parts, and even real-time book photos directly to our smart-board during lessons."


#### **Cengage Unlimited**

Cengage will be offering a semesterly plan starting in Fall of 2024, where all digital resources (e-books and related study guides, educational clips, and learning tools) will be available for 4 months (one academic semester) for a measly price of \$130 per semester. This translates to many benefits for both students and faculty. For students, they no longer have to be burdened by the accumulated cost of textbooks, which usually adds up to more than \$500 per semester. For faculty, the unlimited textbooks covering a myriad of learning subjects will allow them to choose chapters from different texts to support them to teach in a way to allow the students to achieve the appropriate learning outcomes, as promised by the college. They will also have the ability to add digital learning resources from other websites to the text that they see fit.

#### Improving Learning Support Services

#### LRC Highlights: CTEC

The Learning Resource Center at CTEC had its fair share of supporting students and College staff alike in the 1st quarter of 2024, starting by assisting EN120A Expository Writing I students by allowing the usage of computers for research and assignment-making purposes. A presentation on Cengage Textbooks and a sneak peek at the coming Cengage Unlimited platform by Ms. Teresa Aureus, the staff & faculty development day. Fifteen (15) journal magazines were also donated to CTEC LRC from the National Campus LRC.

#### LRC Highlights: Chuuk Campus

Two people were hired to fill the roles of Librarian and Library Assistant II in Chuuk Campus's LRC. The Library Assistant II position, however, was again vacant in March. Three Work-Study students were hired to gain work experience and help assist with the provision of library services. Acting LRC Director, Karleen Samuel, and National Campus LRC Staff, Lucy Oducado, visited Chuuk LRC to provide library training services.

#### LRC Highlights: Kosrae Campus

Two backup batteries were purchased, as per the request from the Kosrae Campus's Learning Resource Center. Other acquired materials include: 8 periodicals, 12 mouse pads, 1 extension cord, and 2 packs of dry erase markers.

#### LRC Highlights: National Campus

Three National Campus LRC positions are advertised and await hiring. A farewell reception was held for fellow LRC worker, Bruce Robert as he retires. LRC hired a special contract, Scarlet Lebehn to assist in providing services in the library. A meeting was held with Jane Barnwell to determine ways to move and discuss the possible methods of growth regarding the Pacific Digital Library Project.

#### LRC Donations

Evaluation and assessment of books in the technical room was conducted to identify materials needed to be removed, set aside for donations, and to be shelved. Weeded materials from last year and this year were donated to Madolenihmw High School, PICS, and the Pohnpei Public Library. Donated materials include newspapers, magazines, journals, books, periodicals and periodical cases.

#### Received

Several databases that contained reliable electronic resources to support learning and research at the National Campus LRC were renewed. The National Campus LRC also received 20 journals and newspapers which are currently on display, and 111 donated materials from the World Health Organization office. Additionally, rearrangements were made to previous shelved materials to support ordering efficiency. The inventory of Journals & Magazines purchased last year was also conducted and a list of titles paid was identified and claimed.

#### **Equipment Developments**






### **Spreading Awareness to Future Enrollees**

# **Visiting State Campuses**

#### Yap Campus and FMI (January 9 - 19)

On her visit to Yap, the VPIA conducted regular meetings with the Dean and the faculty from both the Yap campus and its sister site

Fisheries and Maritime Institute. She observed the operation of both sites and welcomed feedback from staff and faculty through in-person meetings and online survey tools. With the assistance of the Yap campus Dean, the VPIA also re-evaluated the campus personnel and



vacancies. The VPIA also urged the faculty and administrators to propose alternatives to combat the enrollment issues at FMI and to prepare to implement Class 4 - level courses. Additionally, five FMI instructors were sent to Japan to undergo intensive maritime training in preparation for these Class 4 - level courses.

#### **CTEC (February 13, 15, & 16)**

In CTEC, the VPIA followed up on previous issues concerning internet connectivity. Meetings were held with CTEC management and faculty on two separate occasions. A tour of the campus facilities and the TRIO facilities at Moylan's building was also conducted in this site visit.

#### Kosrae Campus (February 26 - March 1))

At the Kosrae Campus, the VPIA held meetings with the faculty and staff and encouraged them to voice their concerns. Internet connectivity issues and being short-staffed was on top of the list of concerns. Renovations and reconstructions of the facilities were also followed up on. The VPIA also met with relevant offices and agencies to spread awareness of the programs offered at the college. Accompanying VPIA Delihna Ehmes was Fiji Phillip, recently hired as the College's AMS Support Staff, who was tasked to conduct faculty training and introduce the new assessment platform the college will

#### Chuuk Campus (March 4 - March 8)

In Chuuk, the VPIA again held meetings with the faculty and staff, encouraging them to voice any concerns they had. The internet connectivity issue was addressed. Renovations and reconstructions of the facilities were also followed up on. The VPIA also met various offices and agencies to spread awareness of the programs offered at the college as an effort to combat student enrollment and retention issues that the college is facing. Fiji Phillip conducted another faculty training to introduce the new assessment platform the college will be using to the Chuuk Campus faculty.

# **Featured Campus**

### **Yap Campus**

Yap Campus is located in Yinuf Village on the main island of Yap. The campus is conveniently located across Yap High School occupying

leased public land. It serves
150 students each semester and about 80-100 students during the summer. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the college began to offer online instruction, making all degree and certificate courses readily



available and accessible to all students across the FSM with internet connectivity, with the exception of courses with laboratory components.

At Yap Campus, we work hand-in-hand to nurture our students to succeed in all their courses and educational ambitions through tutorials, student engagement activities, counseling, and Financial



Aid assistance. We foster academic advisement through POW WOW meetings between advisors and their respective advisees. Other

resources to promote student success, our top priority, include a Learning Resource Center, Student Center, computer labs, an active SBA, and SEG Work Study. Our outreach programs include Cooperative Research Extension (CRE), which



promotes agriculture and aquaculture projects, research, and extension services in our communities, and Upward Bound TRiO Program. Yap UB is federally funded by US Department of Education with the goal of serving Yap High School students to complete their secondary education and achieve a college degree.

### **Campus TIDBITS**

#### The Goods:

# **Featured Program**

## **Agriculture & Natural Resource Management Program**

The long cherished goal of creating education that was suited to the needs of the Micronesian economy was addressed by the creation of three new sector industries during the mid-1980s. The three major industries other than government and education in Micronesia were tourism, farming and fisheries. FSM government requested that the College create programs in Agriculture and Marine Science. In 1981, the members of the College (College of Micronesia-FSM, Palau Community, and Marshall Island Community College) granted the U.S Land Grant Status. This program was created by an act of the Congress of Micronesia, to fulfill the long cherished goal of creating education that was suited to the needs of the island economy. In 1981, the Commi

College of Micronesia was given a Land Grant Intuitions status by the **United States Congress** through the United States Department of Agriculture as part of the compact of free association between



the United states and the three Micronesian entities. This fund created the College of Micronesia, which included FSM, RMI, and ROP. Programs that were established include the Cooperative Extension Service (CES), Agriculture Experiment Station, (AES), and a residential agriculture instruction program (RI). The Agriculture A.S. Degree Program was established in early 1990's and had its first graduate in 1993. The FSM and the United States of America continues to support the program

because they believe that agriculture is an important component of FSM's economic. Over many years the US continues to provide support to the program by providing funds to pay faculty salaries, providing support for scholarship through



Agriculture development in the Asia Pacific (ADAP). Just recently the ADAP program ended and new programs developed; one of the most recent programs that support the agriculture program was the CARIPAC program that is under our CRE program today. Today student enrollment and transfers have increased and more students are graduating from this program each year.

# **UOG College of Applied Sciences: Agriculture and Life Sciences**

A team from University of Guam: College of Natural and Applied Sciences - Agriculture and Life Sciences visited Yap Campus. In this team were Frank Cruz, a retired Horticulturist, a staff/research associate, and several Master's degree/graduate students including Rennie Taiwerpal, from Yap. The UOG team had a forum with instructors Dr. Joy Guarin, Dr. Murukesan, and Mr. Francis Ruegorong and Dean of Academic Programs Kasiano Paul.

Their visit was organized by VPCRE Steven to work in cooperation with Yap CRE and the main purpose of the visit to Yap was to work with the

college in aligning Agriculture and Marine Sciences programs between the two institutions for a 2+2 pathway including an online option. Discussions were also on how their Master's degree program in Agriculture may be offered fully online.



All students in Yap Campus' Agriculture and Food Technology (CA) program also participated in the presentations by the UOG Team, as well as the UOG team's demonstrations on subjects of agriculture & pruning trees.

#### **Program Promises:**

To enrich the program, the curriculum is structured to offer a wellrounded education in basic and applied sciences of agriculture to produce agricultural graduates who are employable or capable of succeeding on transferring into four institutions. The program blends comprehensive classroom instruction with practical experience.

The intention of the program is to graduate skilled agriculturists who can further develop and promote agriculture across the nation as well as providing continuing education for in-service state agriculture extension service employees, secondary agriculture teachers and those who are self-employed.

The **Program Student Learning Outcomes** for the Agriculture and Natural Resources Management program are as follows:

- ANRM\_PSLO\_1. Acquire fundamental concepts and principles of land resources focusing towards development and production in a sustainable manner appropriate to Micronesia.
- ANRM\_PSLO\_2. Demonstrate basic competencies in the management of land resources and food production.
- ANRM\_PSLO\_3. Acquire basic skills, knowledge and attitude to manage a sustainable food production enterprise or qualify for entrylevel employment in a land resource management related agency.
- ANRM\_PSLO\_4. Acquire a sound scientific background that will allow transfer to a higher degree program related to land resources and food systems.

### **Staff Development: Updated AMS Faculty Training**

With the college receiving the updated Assessment Management System, the Nuventive Improvement Platform, proper training should be conducted for the faculty so that they may be able to input their periodic course assessment results using the new platform. This, in conjunction with the VPIA's already planned site visits to Kosrae and Chuuk campuses, brought an opportunity to conduct Assessment Management System Faculty Training sessions.

The following learning outcomes of the training sessions were to be met through an oral presentation and hands-on activities:

- To demonstrate basic understanding of the Assessment Management System
- To demonstrate proficiency in entering course assessment plan information
- To demonstrate proficiency in entering course assessment results
- To demonstrate proficiency in using the document repository
- To demonstrate proficiency in generating reports

The first two sessions were conducted in Kosrae Campus for the 8 faculty members currently teaching this semester.

In the first session in Kosrae Campus, the overview of the AMS was covered. The faculty member also attempted to access the demo AMS site, with all but one failing to gain access to the site.



diagnosed and fixed for the next session, which required access to the site to complete the hands-on activities.



In the second session, 4 hands-on activities were assigned to the faculty members to assess their skills in navigating through the platform, creating course assessment plans, inputting course assessment results, and

creating folders and uploading documents to the document repository in the new AMS. By the end of the session, faculty members started their assigned activities (one completing the entire set in that single sitting).

Faculty training sessions of the same nature were conducted in Chuuk Campus. Again, the first session covered the overview of the new AMS,

while the second session covered the assignments used to assess the members' proficiency in different areas when using the new AMS.



After the training sessions in both campuses, the trainer sent out a Post Training Survey to collect input on how to further develop the content for future training sessions.

# A Spotlight on Issues

### **Challenges:**

- Faculty will need to be on board with ebooks which currently the greater number of faculty are not.
- Assessments by the faculty are submitted every year and every 2, 4, and 7 years but there has not been any feedback from an assessment committee or office which does not exist at this time.
- 🙀 Vacancies remain unoccupied after multiple postings.
- Limited number of staff at campuses resulted in multiple roles for one individual
- Internet connectivity issues limit the productivity of both staff and students at state campuses

### **Recommendations:**

- Faculty received training from Cengage and Pearson to understand the benefits of switching to e-books in terms of cost for the college and efficiency in teaching and learning.
- VPIA and VPIEQA departments need to collaborate to ensure that an assessment committee or office is operating to provide feedback and recommendation for assessments.
- The VPIA dept. can recommend hard-to-fill positions to have additional compensation or work closely with HRO to find other ways of posting vacancies wider.
- Provide cross-training for staff and maybe increase salary for existing staff who will carry on additional roles.
- Starlink Dishes were ordered and installed in requested state campuses to improve internet speed, thus improving communication and productivity levels.
