Accomplishments during this period:

- Jackson Phillip presented the Piggery Advisory Council of Pohnpei information at the Soils Conference at University of Guam, January 14-15, 2013
- Two CariPac Project proposals have been completed and submitted through the Administrative universities.
- All CRE vehicles have been inventoried and insured
- Personnel issues: Vacant position report
 - Chuuk – 3 positions
 - State Coordinator position has been filled – Mr. Mike Abbe
 - Nutrition Agent III position – to be downgraded to a Nutrition agent II – the screening committee has made a selection however it has not received final approval through the system
 - CRD Agent II has been accepted through HR for announcement
 - Chuuk Agriculture Agent has resigned to move to California
 - Yap -3 positions
 - State Coordinator was terminated due to poor performance
 - Acting State Coordinator responsibility has been taken on by Steven Young Uhk
 - Personnel requisition forms for SC Yap have passed through HR and should be announced this week
 - Yap Agriculture Agent position to be announced at the Agent II level to provide a more competitive starting salary
 - Yap Home Economics Agent to be renamed Nutrition Agent II to allow a more competitive starting salary
 - PNI – 2 positions
 - Pohnpei Nutrition Assistant position filled by Rosalinda Sylbanuz – an AS graduate from COM-FSM
 - PNI Researcher position – we have received 6 applications. State coordinator has called a meeting of the review committee for Tuesday next week.
 - PNI Agriculture Agent position to be posted as Agent II to provide a more competitive starting salary
 - Kosrae – 1 support position
 - Administrative Assistant position – awaiting PR form from State Coordinator
- The issue of position vacancies is a concern as the salaries being offered at the level of agents is not appealing for AS graduates let alone BS graduates. The Researcher positions were assigned a higher position on the salary scale with PhDs starting at the same level as PhDs in the instructional faculty
- The fy' 13 COM-LGP Budget and the fy' 14 COM-FSM budget have been submitted
- Fund Status Reports for all accounts have been distributed to State Coordinators and Researchers for balances and expenditures to February 12th

- PNI-CRE/ Extension agents began trainings for farmers on black pepper production. The first two of three trainings have been completed.
- PNI-CRE/ EFENP training and home gardening in the community of U, Nan Welin Rohi. Training covered cooking demonstrations, nutrition and home gardening. Additionally, agent conducted training at schools, ECE parents, and community people. ECE parents, to upgrade skills and knowledge on nutrition and health related issues. The total number of participated were 185. EFNEP PROGRAM
- PNI-CRE/ The community pearl farm training has been conducted 3 times in this quarter at Peniou & Pakin.
- Yap CRE has submitted two project proposals with Logic models to LGP For consideration for funding
- Yap CRE collaborated with Yap State R&D, the governor and community members to test a suspected Banana Bunchytop virus (BBTV) concern. Proof negative.
- Yap CRE has collaborated with the Public Safety to set up a garden training center for inmates at the central prison.
- Yap CRE - Conducted survey of small chicken farmers in Yap. Results were: There are currently 11 small family production units ranging from 4 to 21 chickens per family (average of 11 chickens) producing a range of 3-19 eggs per day. 8 farmers sell their eggs at a price range of \$3.75 to \$4.20 per dozen and/or \$0.40 to 0.50 per fresh or boiled egg earning extra income. 9 farmers use their eggs for home consumption. 8 farmers use commercial feed, 2 farmers use combination of commercial feed and local feed materials, and 1 farmer uses only local feed materials. Housing is simple with an enclosed pen using bamboo, wire, or plastic fencing, thatch or tin roof and either wire or dry litter flooring. Future plans for these farmers are similar with high interests in increasing their production level.
- Yap CRE youth Agent Collaborated with Youth Services office and Yap Sports Council in planning an After-School sport tournament for boys and girls. Martin Ruwniyol is training new referees and is coaching the COM-FSM Volleyball team.
- Yap CRE Youth Agent started the Guest Speaker Program at St. Mary's Elementary School. Subject taught to 37 students in the 8th grade class was on Human Nutrition.
- Coordinated, facilitated and assisted in the local produce market survey conducted by Frank Cruz, Bob Barber and Frank Maloney and a WSARE grant presentation by Bob Barber
- Hands-on training was provided to two farmers who wanted to know how to build simple solar dryers for drying local materials to feed chicken. Technical assistance was provided to a

group of farmers who are cooperatively importing chicken feed thereby significantly reducing costs to about 30% less than local vendors.

- Chuuk CRE Agriculture extension agents worked with the Environmental Protection Agency in teaching and monitoring Mwan, Mechitiw and Iras communities in segregating wastes and using biodegradable wastes for compost making. The community women learned basic gardening including composting through actual demos and power point presentation.
- Youth –at Risk program graduated 21 drop out high school students for re-admission to their respective schools and/or GED program last December 5 after three months of training started in October 2012.
- Agroforestry nurseries established and maintained in five regions of Chuuk are providing planting materials of local crops (taro, tapioca, banana, eggplant, long beans, papaya) to interested community residents.

Accomplishment Report for the period of December 2012 - February 2013

The Kosrae Agricultural Experiment Station and Cooperative Extension concentrated on three research and extension projects on In Vitro Selection for Salt Tolerance in Taro; In Vitro Selection for Salt Tolerance in Sweet Potato; and Multiplication and Distribution of Banana, Taro, Sweet Potato and Noni in the State of Kosrae.

More germplasm of different varieties of swamp taro, soft taro and sweet potato have been collected, planted and maintained in the greenhouse for research projects. Various types of media formulation and preparation for maintenance, sub-culture and screening for stress tolerance are under progress for swamp taro, soft taro and sweet potato cultures. More than 1,200 cultures of sweet potato, swamp taro and soft taro were sub-cultured on multiplication media or transferred on screening media. In vitro screening to study salt tolerance level in collected and tissue culture maintained germplasm of taro and sweet potato has been started.

The Kosrae Agricultural Experiment Station continued seedling distribution, farm visits for on-site recommendations, and extension brochure distribution. During visits, technical assistance and support, and extension brochure(s) were provided to farmers on appropriate farming techniques and practices. Transfer of tissue-cultured plantlets from growth room to greenhouse for acclimatization, from greenhouse to nursery for maintenance, and distribution are being continued. In the reporting period, more than 1,500 taro and 400 sweet potato seedlings were produced, and 580 taro and 200 sweet potato plants were distributed to interested farmers. In the reporting period, more than 200 vegetable seedlings were produced, and 50 seedlings were distributed to interested farmers.

CES PNI continues to collaborate with Dr. Dennik and Fukumoto, CTAHR in the project entitle: Developing Farmers Field Schools to promote the adaptation of pig manure composting in Pohnpei. The project is going well, though has been difficult to implement. Gaps have been identified and Investigators and collaborators have discussed plans for intervention.

**Kosrae Cooperative Extension Service Accomplishment Report
From
December 2012 to January 2013**

Accomplishment Report for BOR Meeting:

Food Processing: During the reporting period, four clients were recruited and engaged with the program. They have learned appropriate techniques of taro flour (grinding, drying, blending and shifting) and storage. They have learned and tasted cookies made from the taro flour. They have learned proper food preparation, safety in the kitchen and proper food storage. All in all they have learned the new food processing techniques such as taro flour and banana ketchup.

Home Gardening: Recruited six backyard gardeners. The Ext. Agent continued to maintain seedling production and maintenance in the nursery; conducted field visits and provide technical assistance to gardeners engaged in the program. Improved collaboration with local partners and worked Kosrae Women in Farming.

EFNEP: The EFNEP Agent continued to work with three groups whom were recruited early November. There were two groups from the communities, and one group consisted of twelve COM-Kosrae campus students and staff. Two groups successfully completed the EFNEP sessions on January. The other community group still continuing with the program. Altogether there were twenty three completed and eight continuing.

Attended a WebNEERS training with the EFNEP Coordinator Ms Margaret Weital from 1/14-18/13. The training included how to input homemakers reporting forms to the new reporting system which is WebNEERS. The EFNEP staff found the WebNEERS more efficient than the ERS.

Sewing Program: The Ext. Assistant has recruited two groups (3 and 12 members). The group of 3 participants have learned the measurement and pattern cutting techniques and have completed 3 balloon skirts at the end of training. Demonstrated how to measure and cut the simplest style of pillowcase to 10 students and 2 school teacher during the reporting period.
