Introduction

The college vision is reviewed at least every five years in accordance with *COM-FSM's Planning Cycle* (IEMP, p. 5). On the previous cycle, a *Visioning Summit* and visioning process was conducted May 2012-May 2013. A *Visioning Summit* was held August 8-9, 2012, at National Campus; November 9, 2012, at Chuuk Campus; November 15, 2012, at Yap Campus; and November 20, 2012, at Kosrae Campus. A Strategic Planning Working Group (SPWG) concluded the work by reviewing summit documents, identifying themes, and proposing a revised vision for endorsement by the Executive Committee and the Board of Regents. This review process was detailed in the *Combined Mid-Term and Follow-Up Report* March 15, 2013, (pp. 31-33), the *Supplemental Report* May 15, 2013, (p. 5), and the *Institutional Self Evaluation Report* (ISER) December 15, 2015 (pp. 64-66).

This report captures the most recent visioning process conducted by the college, in accordance with its planning cycle, and focuses on the *vision statement* recommendations from the Strategic Planning Working Group (SPWG).

Current Vision Statement Review

As per the <u>Master Planning Calendar</u>, the next college-wide Visioning Summit was scheduled for and thus conducted during August 2-3, 2016, at the National Campus in Pohnpei. The Visioning Summit was then replicated in Yap, Chuuk, and Kosrae during August-September 2016.

Results and Recommendations for Consideration

During an October 3-5, 2016 retreat, the SPWG examined summit reports, the *Board of Regents Two-Year Action Agenda (2017-2019)*, and the previous COM-FSM *Strategic Plan* to develop possible college vision statements. The SPWG proposed twenty possible vision statements, and through working group consensus narrowed those to seven for consideration by the college community (Table 1). The SPWG conducted a college-wide survey on the seven proposed vision statement options. The survey was conducted February 28 –March 10, 2017, prior to releasing this report and recommendations to the Executive Committee and Board of Regents. In the college survey, individuals were asked to rank these seven vision statement options from most (1) to least (7) favorite, and the results for 144 respondents are presented in Tables 1 and 2.

The SPWG recommends that the Cabinet and the Executive Committee consider these results (Tables 1 and 2) and at least narrow them to only Options 3 and 5, as chosen by the majority of respondents. The SPWG also wishes to emphasize that *Option 5* was the most popular first choice with 68 respondents compared to only 43 respondents choosing *Option 3*.

Tense for the Visioning Statement

The SPWG debated the importance of using *future tense*, to emphasize that the vision statement represents where we want to go within the next five years. Others felt the vision statement should be stated in the *present tense* because it will be our focus, upon implementation of the strategic plan, for the next five years. Thus, we should not speak about that vision as future when implemented, but

what we are doing from that point forward--*now*. The SPWG was split on this matter, and thus it was decided that larger college opinion should be solicited for preference of statement tense. The results (Table 3) showed that the majority of respondents (110/144 = 77.46%) preferred using the present tense over those respondents who favored using the future tense (32/144 = 22.54%). Thus, the SPWG recommends the college use the present tense for its vision statement. Thus, Options 3 and 5 should be written as:

- **Option 3**: We focus on student success to be the best higher education institution in the region.
- **Option 5**: We provide quality education today for a successful tomorrow.
 - (A reminder this was the most popular choice).

The SPWG also highlights that 10/17 respondents who offered alternative vision statements for consideration (Table 4), actually offered variations on the most popular choice, Option 5, *We provide quality education today for a successful tomorrow*. Quality education resonated with the majority of respondents.

Cabinet and Executive Committee Endorsement

On March 17, 2017, the Cabinet reviewed the SPWG report and determined that the college should recommend the Board of Regents adopt the most popular vision statement, Option 5 (Tables 1 and 2).

• **Option 5**: We provide quality education today for a successful tomorrow.

Additionally, the Cabinet agreed that the vision statement should be presented in the *present tense*, as supported by the college majority vote (Table 3). Moreover, the Cabinet pointed out that each of the two most popular options (3 and 5) still speak to the future ("...to be the best..." and "...for a successful tomorrow") and thus meet the expectation that our vision statement is about where we want to be within five years.

The Cabinet debated whether the Board of Regents should be presented with options, but also did not want to appear to lessen the fact that the majority of the respondents chose Option 5. The Cabinet endorsed this report being provided to the Board of Regents, with a recommendation the Board of Regents support Option 5 as the college's next vision statement. And, if the Board of Regents would like to consider an alternative, that they should only additionally consider Option 3, because the remaining five options were not close contenders.

- **Option 5**: We provide quality education today for a successful tomorrow. (most popular)
- **Option 3**: We focus on student success to be the best higher education institution in the region. (2nd most popular)

Finally, Options 3 and 5 are aligned with the current proposed strategic directions of the SPWG, and those are:

Innovate academic quality to ensure student success, and Strengthen resources to meet current and future needs.

On March 24, 2017, the Executive Committee (EC) reviewed the SPWG recommendation, and the recommendation and endorsement of the Cabinet. The EC concurred with and endorsed the recommendation of the SPWG and the Cabinet. During the May 3-4, 2017, board meeting, the Board of Regents will be provided this report, and recommended to endorse vision statement

Option 5. If the board would like an alternative for consideration, they should only additionally consider vision statement Option 3.
