- ▶ All five buildings have been substantially completed by 95%, and contractors are working on the punch list items. Final completion is expected within two weeks.

## **College awarded \$1.2 million Federal Pell Grant** to 897 students last summer 2018

FAO awards Pell to 82% of the 1,097 students registered last summer 2018

The college's Financial Aid Office (FAO) reported that it awarded \$1,252,303.90 Federal Pell Grant to 897 students (or 82%) of the 1,097 students registered last summer 2018. According to the Director of FAO, "Of the 897 students, 276 were new students, 583 were continuing students, and 38 were returning students. 81% (or 583) of the 721 continuing students received summer Pell Grant. Last summer 2017, only 53% (or 517) of the 968 students were Pell eligible and received Pell Grant." Table below shows the distribution by campus:

The Director of FAO also added that beginning with the 2017-2018 academic year, an eligible student may now receive a full Federal Pell Grant for summer 2018, even if they received a full Federal Pell Grant during the fall and winter semesters. Year-Round Pell allows students to receive up to 150 percent of a regular grant award over the course of the academic year so that they can continue taking classes in the summer and finish their degrees faster than they would, otherwise. However, to be eligible for the additional Pell Grant funds, the student must meet all general eligibility requirements to receive financial aid for the payment period and must be enrolled at least half time (six credits) in the payment period.

### \$74,255.60 Supplemental Grant (SEG) to students last summer 2018

25 students received \$1,779.50 from the summer 2018 SEG Work-Study Program. Two students received \$1,750.00 from the FSM National Scholarship

The college's Financial Aid Office (FAO) reported that \$74,255.60 Supplemental Education Grant were awarded to 123 students enrolled last summer 2018. Table below shows the distribution by campus:

2018, Advising Summit in the practice gym of the FSM-China Friendship Sports Center, Palikir, Pohnpei. According to the Director of FAO, "Financial aid is the monetary lifeblood for COM-FSM students, and thus of primary concern to them. It befits the academic advisor, then, to know at least the basics of the financial aid system in order to advise effectively."

The session covered topics, such as year-round Pell, Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP), Pell recalculation date, return to Title IV, the financial aid appeal process, and others. The session received a 96% positive rating from the participants.

# College surpassed its summer 2018 headcount enrollment target by 8%





The college registered enrollment of 1,097 headcounts with 6,553 registered credits (or equivalent to 1,092 full-time equivalent students) last summer 2018. If compared to its summer 2018 enrollment targets, these figures indicate that the college surpassed its headcount target by 8%, but achieved its credit target by only 84%.

According to the college's Registrar, "If compared last summer 2017 enrollment, the college has seen an increase in the summer 2018 headcount and registered credits by 13% and 23%, respectively. College-wide new students headcount enrollment increased by 17%. College-wide continuing and returning students headcount enrollment increased by 8% and 12%, respectively." ### Purchase orders and receiving report processing

- ▶ A total of 4,384 purchase orders (PO) and 3,999 receiving reports were processed using the MIP system for the current fiscal year 2017-2018.
- ▶ The PO log is continuously updated in order to keep track of the status of all purchases of the college and provide real-time status of the POs.

▶ Continuing the process of tagging and documenting fixed assets purchased by the different departments as soon as the items are delivered or received.

▶ The screening and recruitment process for Director of Procurement's position has been completed, and a recommendation letter was transmitted to the Office of the President for approval.

# College registered 1,930 students for fall 2018 semester

The college's Registrar reported that as of August 24, 2018, the college enrolled 1,930 students with 23,206.5 registered credits, or equivalent to 1,934 full-time equivalent (FTE) students. Table below shows the distribution by campus:

Foregoing table shows a college-wide FTE enrollment 0.24% higher than the headcount enrollment. National Campus and Chuuk Campus have FTE enrollments higher than their headcount enrollments by 6.32% and 1.24%, respectively.

### Fall 2018 Student Demographics

 Of the 1,930 students, 1,401 (or 73%) are registered as continuing students, 425 (or 22%) are registered as new students, and 104 (or 5%) are registered as returning students.



#### **Student Activities**

During summer 2018, the Office of the Director of Student Life (DSL) hosted and supported a number of student activities. These activities were aimed to promote and foster student engagement and involvement. According to the DSL, "A study by the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics showed that participation in extracurricular activities is linked to student success." While there were many smaller events organized across all of the college's campuses, listed below are some of the major events and activities held:

- ▶ Kosrae Campus students conducted an overnight retreat to a remote village in Walung. Students had partnered with the COM-FSM SS 120 (Introduction to Geography) class to explore and understand the land and its inhabitants. Activities included, cultural explorations focused on traditional Kosrae cooking techniques, as well as, student presentations and speeches.
- ▶ Chuuk Campus students participated and assisted in the building of a cultural hut on campus. This hut, meant to provide an additional meeting space for students, faculty and staff alike, was completed with the generous support of Dean Kind Kanto and his family.
- ▶ The Madolenihmw Student Organization, consisting of students from both National Campus and the Career & Technical Education Center (CTEC) held an overnight retreat on Dekehtik Island. The retreat focused on raising environmental awareness and promoted the use of sustainable agriculture and/or fishing practices. The Marine Environmental Research Institute of Pohnpei (MERIP) and the Conservation Society of Pohnpei (CSP) provided presentations and information sharing. Students also had the opportunity to participate in a trash-a-thon community service activity, aimed at cleaning up Pohnpei.
- Selected students from the National Campus and CTEC participated in an overnight Peer Coach Training aimed at developing leadership skills and preparing them for their roles as student mentors. A variety of activities, discussions, workshops and presentations were held on leadership, mentoring, Title IX, as well as, health and nutrition. Since then, these students have assisted in the preparations and execution of a number of College events, such as college tours and visits, new student orientation, and registration.

### **Health Services**

A total of 866 students, faculty and staff visited the dispensary at National Campus, and 185 at CTEC, from May to August 2018. Outside of these visits, the dispensaries at both National & CTEC hosted a number of outreach efforts, focused on TB and Leprosy screenings and information sharing, and STI screenings.

At Chuuk campus, efforts were also put forth to hold informational sessions and presentations on early pregnancy, influenza, as well as, substance use - with a focus on chewing Betel nut. As of report, the dispensary at Chuuk is now preparing to host an annual Health Fair, scheduled to take place early this semester.

### **Sports and Recreation**

During the summer semester, three intramural competitions were held in Basketball, Table Tennis and Pool Table. A total of 51 students, faculty and staff members participated in these games, with first, second and third place being awarded for each competition. Sports & Recreation also hosted two Exchange Goodwill Basketball Games with the local communities of Madolenihmw and Sekere. These games, which were mostly attended by Residence Hall students, provided student participants the opportunity to interact with local community members, building positive relationships.

### **Residence Halls**

Last summer 2018, a total of 47 students resided in the Residence Hall, of those 20 were male and 27 were female. Students represented during the summer included those from Pohnpei, Chuuk, Kosrae and Yap.

- 1,421 (or 74%) are registered full-time (12 registered credits and above); while 509 (or 26%) are registered part-time (Less than 12 registered credits). Last fall 2017, the college had an enrollment of 72% and 27% full-time and part-time students, respectively. By student type:
  - Continuing students. 71% full-time students, and 29% part-time students. If compared to fall 2017 enrollment figures, an increase of 1% in terms of full-time student enrollment and a decrease in the part-time student enrollment by 1%.
  - New students. 85% full-time students, and 15% part-time students. If compared to fall 2017 enrollment figures, an increase of 2% in terms of full-time student enrollment and a decrease in the part-time student enrollment by 2%.
  - Returning students. 59% full-time students, and 41% part-time students. If compared to fall 2017 enrollment figures, an increase of 3% in terms of full-time student enrollment and a decrease in the part-time student enrollment by 3%.
- 3. The college has a predominantly female enrollment this fall 2018 term. 55% (or 1,064) are female students, and 45% (or 866) are male students.

Fall 2018 enrollment average credit load is 12 credits. Average credit load for new student is 13 credits. Average credit load for continuing and returning students are 12 and 11 credits, respectively.







# President designated VPEMSS as IPEDS keyholder for the college

The President and Chief Executive Officer has designated the Vice President for Enrollment Management & Student Services (VPEMSS) as the college's keyholder for the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). IPEDS is a system of interrelated surveys conducted annually by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), a part of the Institute for Education Sciences within the United States Department of Education. As of report, VPEMSS in collaboration with the Office of Institutional Effectiveness (OIE) under the Acting Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness & Quality Assurance (VPIEQA) has completed registration (institution mapping, institution identification, and institutional characteristics) in preparation for the 2018-2019 surveys. The deadline for this registration will be on October 17, 2018.


According to the VPEMSS, "2018-2019 Winter Survey is scheduled on December 12, 2018, and will close, February 13, 2019. This survey requires the college to report data on student financial aid, graduation rates, admissions, and outcome measures." Spring 2019 IPEDS Survey is scheduled on December 12, 2018, to April 10, 2019, which requires the college to report data on fall enrollment, human resources, and academic library, he added.



### **Incubator Program**

The Center worked with its **Incubator Program Businesses** to renew registrations scheduled for renewal, and continues post-incubator support by providing training on business tax filling.

- ▶ 4Stars had just concluded its one-year training contract with the National Fisheries Corporation (NFC), which started at the completion of the designing of the website last August 2017. Students who run 4stars trained NFC's Information Technology (IT) staff in maintaining and updating the website. The NFC's Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and IT manager expressed great appreciation and commended 4stars for its continual and ready support, professional conduct, and quick turnaround time. 4stars has earned \$3,000.00, over the course of the yearlong training.
- ▶In preparation for the greenhouses, members of the Hydroponics of the Pacific (HOP) constructed several makeshiftgreenhouses in order to test their entrepreneurial skills and experiment on crops to determine which ones will grow using hydroponic technology. HOP team also set up a tent outside the CTEC's auto-shop to sell fresh lettuce, bok choy, and cabbages to passer-byes. A total of 94 crops were sold during the sale, and earned \$120 in revenues. The Center received materials for its greenhouse project. As of report, the Center securing quotations from local contractors to build the greenhouses. The Center extend its appreciation to the Director of Maintenance & Facilities, Francisco Mendiola, and his staff for clearing the land in preparation for the construction of the greenhouses.
- ▶ RentAText continued to work closely with the bookstore in servicing the students. It managed to bring in an estimated \$1,500.00 in profits over the summer and expect to make much more over the fall semester when there are considerably more students and classes that require textbooks.
- **MYCAST** continues to work with the PMK fish market in the beautification of their building. It has also concluded training on how to reach out to a customer base that is more active online, and setting-up PMK's Facebook page. MYCAST also collaborated with AukuLife to promote each other businesses. AukuLife is a Pohnpeian-owned business stationed in the United States. AukuLife has agreed to promote MYCAST with its products, while MYCAST would act as an onisland vendor for the products of AukuLife, taking a percentage of all sales. Towards the end of the summer 2018, Fusion Restaurant hired MYCAST as a marketing team to promote the restaurant, which includes the setup of the restaurant's Facebook page, video creation and photography.

# Student life and Campus Security & Safety completed program review

Two units under the college's Department for Enrollment Management & Student Services (EMSS) had completed and submitted their program reviews to the Assessment Team. Program review is a cyclical process for evaluating and continuously enhancing the quality and currency of programs. The college strives to continuously improve the quality and efficacy of its programs and services, such as all academic and non-academic departments and units are required conduct annual program assessments, and program reviews are conducted biennially for certificate programs, and every four years for all other instructional programs and all administrative units.

According to the VPEMSS, "On January 22, 2018, Campus Security & Safety completed its program review for AY 2014-2017, and on March 18, 2018, Student Life which is comprised of the Office of the Director of Student Life, the Residence Halls, Health Services, and Sports & Recreation, completed its 2015-2017 program review to the Assessment Team for review. Program reviews of these units were submitted to the college's Assessment Team for Review."
