# COLLEGE AWARDS \$1.374M PELL GRANT TO 100% OF THE ELIGIBLE STUDENT ENROLLED LAST SUMMER 2021

The college's Financial Aid Office (FAO) reported that it awarded \$1,374,092.00 Pell Grant to 937 students or 100% of the Pell-

eligible students enrolled last summer 2021. Table below shows the distribution by campus.

# **1,917 students registered for fall 2021**

The college has a fall 2021 enrollment¹ of 1,917 head counts with 21,863 registered credits, which is equivalent to 1,822 full-time equivalent students.

According to the college's registrar, "If compared to last fall 2020, the college has seen an increase in its college-wide enrollment in head counts and registered

credits (or FTE) by 3% and 3%, respectively. Vis-à-vis fall 2020 enrollment, National Campus has seen an 18% increase in its head count enrollment, and 20% increase in its registered credit enrollment." Table below shows the distribution by campus.

The college's registrar further reported that the college-wide fall 2021 enrollment in headcounts and registered credits are below the enrollment targets for fall 2021 by 3% and 11%, respectively. The enrollment targets provide the college data on revenue projections which are used to guide annual budget development.

Yap Campus has surpassed its fall 2021 targets in head counts and registered credits by 35% and 32%, respectively. While Chuuk Campus exceeded its fall 2021 target in head counts by 13%, it is behind its target in registered credits by 3%. Table below shows the distribution by campus.

- Chuuk Campus has 10.18, which is 14% lower than its target.
- Kosrae Campus has 9.07, which is 10% lower than its target.

Of the 1,917 (N) students registered this fall

▶ 1,478 (or 77% of N) are registered as continuing students; 295 (or 15% of N) are new students; and 144 (or 8% of N) are returning students. Note that the college registered 369 new students last summer 2021, of which 337 (or 91%) registered this fall as continuing students.

▶ 1,281 (or 67% of N) are registered fulltime; while, 636 (or 33% of N) are registered part-time. Table below shows the college-wide enrollment distribution by identification of students and by campus.

The college has shifted from fully online classes to 61% face-to-face classes at all campuses and 39% of the classes remain online. We are offering 51 more class sections fall 2021 than in fall 2020. The ratio of fulltime to part-time faculty remains about the same as in previous years.

#### Hydroponic greenhouses shift to renewable energy



The Center for Entrepreneurship (CFE) completed the installation of its farm's solar energy system, which is funded by the Australian Embassy's Direct Aid Program (DAP). According to the CFE Executive Director, "The Center received a \$15,000.00 funding under DAP of the Australian Embassy to convert the farms into renewable energy. Specifically, the goal of the grant is to purchase one solar energy system including 4 solar street lights and 10 solar fans."

The systems are expected to run the hydroponic pumps without power interruptions and will provide enough electricity to run all other equipment used for the farm's operations. The system has a 3,000 watts per hour capacity, enough to run ten times consumption of the current farms. With the expected upgrades of the greenhouses from the \$900k EDA grant, the solar panels will be more than enough to power the expected 50'x50' greenhouse from EDA and the 40'x70' greenhouse from the Australian embassy.

The upcoming expansion plans for the farm will increase the farms production from 1,200 to 2,500 crops or up to 6,000 pounds of fresh vegetables every month. In addition to providing a sustainable source of vegetables to the college, the new greenhouse will also provide a more professional environment and better overall learning experience for staff and student interns alike. Because commercial grade systems will be installed and the new facility will be modeled after commercial Hydroponic farms in the Philippines, students who visit the farm will have a better understanding of what it takes to run a commercial hydroponic

### CFE Learning Through Immersion (LTI) Project interns featured in UNICEF's regional publication

Ms. Jeannyleen Andrew, an intern of the CFE's LTI Project was featured in the United Nations Children Fund's (UNICEF) Pacific website, Instagram, and Facebook page. Ms. Andrew is registered this fall 2021 in the college's Health Career Opportunity Program (HCOP).

In May of 2021, the interns of the CFE's LTI Program organized a series of activities to celebrate the "World Menstrual Hygiene and Health Month" to raise awareness about proper menstrual hygiene and health management. One of the creative ways the interns thought of in their activities is the creation of menstrual hygiene bracelets that will signify a person's support in breaking the stigma of menstrual health. The menstrual hygiene bracelets were distributed during the Menstrual Hygiene Management Day Forum on May 28, 2021, at the college. According to Ms. Andrew, "We distributed the menstruation bracelets after the forum and both girls and boys wanted to know more about them. We explained that the red seeds represent the five days of a period
