EARLY REGISTRATION: COLLEGE HOLDS EARLY REGISTRATION FOR SPRING 2023

625 STUDENTS EARLY REGISTERED FOR SPRING 2023 SEMESTER





The college registered 625 students with 7,897 registered credits (or 658 full-time equivalent students) during the early registration for spring 2023 last October 31 to November 4, 2022. College has an early regisrtration enrollment of FTE 5% higher than headcount.

According to Mr. Doman Daoas, Registrar, "As of November 4, 2022, the college registered students and credits representing 40% and 51% of the college's spring 2023 enrollment targets.

ON-CAMPUS VACCINATION DRIVE: BIVALENT BOOSTER SHOTS AND FLU VACCINES

The department for Enrollment Management & Student Services (EMSS) coordinated with the Immunization Program of the FSM Department of Health and Social Affairs to launch COVID-19 vaccination drive (including Bivalent COVID-19 booster shots) and Influenza (flu) vaccines for students and college employees at the National Campus and the Career & Technical Education Center (CTEC) last October 6 and 7, 2022, respectively.

FINANCIAL AID: COLLEGE AWARDS \$2.383M PELL **GRANT TO 785 STUDENTS ENROLLED THIS FALL 2022**

110 STDENT RECEIVED \$110,684 FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FROM THE SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATION GRANT (SEG) DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD

The college's Financial Aid Office (FAO) reported that as of November 4, 2022, it awarded \$2,383,322.12 Pell Grant to 785 students enrolled this fall 2022 semester.

For Academic Year (AY) 2021-2022, which covered fall 2021, spring 2022, and summer terms, FAO awarded students Pell Grants in the amount of \$9,988,969.61.

During the period beginning September 10, 2022, and ending November 2, 2022, it awarded 110 students \$110,684.90 of financial assistance from Supplemental Education Grant (SEG), and 343 students who enrolled in the SEG Work-Study Program, \$46,018.00.

According to the acting Director of FAO, "For AY 2021-2022, FAO awarded students \$386,556.54 and \$298,126.50 financial assistance from the SEG and SEG Work-Study Program, respectively.'

CTEC COUNSELING SERVICES

Workshop on Managing Test Anxiety

On September 28, 2022, CTEC counselor Cindy Edwin conducted a workshop on "Managing Test Anxiety" to help students prepare for their exams and/ or to be able apply techniques throughout their courses.

The workshop covered topics on: (a) what test anxiety is; (b) assessment of the source of anxiety; (c) strategies for test taking; (d) effective test taking strategies for multiple choice, true-false, short answer questions, open book and math; and (e) various stress management techniques.

IOM Youth Leadership Summit

CTEC counselor Cindy Edwin continues to stay in communication with International Organization for Migration (IOM) staff, specifically Harut Sarian and Brandon Taiwermal, regarding their final meeting with students who participated iin the 2nd Youth Leadership Summit in July.

The Youth Leadership Summit is sponsored by IOM and was held at the Career and Technical Education Center (CTEC) in July. This is the second, with the first being at National Campus last year. Students were to create a project proposal based on a project they would like to implement on campus. IOM will help with up \$750 of the project's funding. Throughout the process, students learned about climate change and project proposals.

From there, they worked in groups to develop their project proposal but because of COVID, they were not able to complete it. IOM was able to meet with each group in late October and worked with them on finalizing their proposals. Instead of having the projects judged, IOM will look to see which ones are most needed on campus that students will be able to implement, and it will be able to fund (\$750 each selected project).

CAPACITY BUILDING: FAO STAFF TO PARTICIPATE IN THE 2022 FEDERAL STUDENT ASSISTANCE (FSA) ANNUAL TRAINING CONFERENCE

Financial Aid Office (FAO) staff will participate in the 2022 Federal Student Assistance (FSA) Annual Training Conference for financial aid professionals on November 29 to December 2, 2022. However, due to the uncertainty of COVID-19, the training conference will be hosted virtually.

This year's conference will offer 33 unique sessions on the latest policy updates about Title IV activities and initiatives, including information about ED's regulatory

efforts, major operational updates, and reminders.

There will be keynote addresses from U.S. Department of Education leadership, five general sessions, one foreign school session, 22 breakout sessions (covering the latest in financial aid policy, COVID-19 related impacts, and operational updates), and a one-day only Exhibit Hall (formerly the Resource Center) on the last day of the conference during which you can engage one-on-one with subject matter experts.
