FAICHUK WINS ACADEMIC TALENT SHOWDOWN









ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE:TERMS OF REFERENCE

The Chuuk Campus Assessment Committee met on Thursday, November 30, in the Dean's Conference Room. The primary discussion was on the Committee's Terms of Reference (TOR).

The TOR is similar to by-laws. Our policy is that every committee must prepare and adopt its own TOR. Members reviewed a draft TOR and scrutinized several articles (sections). Of major concern was Committee membership — how many members, their selection, and tenure.

The draft TOR will be re-drafted by ex-officio Secretary Alton Higashi and submitted back to the Committee by email for review and further discussion in January 2018.

Another discussion point was on planning for training of all Chuuk Campus employees. An essential conclusion was that employees' performance of duties and responsibilities does not measure student learning. To say that a person does his job is not a guarantee that students learn anything from what he does. We need to transform duties and responsibilities into measurable student learning outcomes.


BEST WISHES TO STUDENTS ON THE FINAL EXAMS
