During the celebration, which was held at the FSM-China Friendship Sports Center, the College graduated 172 students. This figure does not include the number of graduates from Kosrae Campus since that campus has different reporting dates. According to the College's Office of Admissions and Records, the College is yet to verify 12 candidates for graduation from Kosrae Campus. In his welcoming remarks, Interim President Ringlen P Ringlen noted that 40 students graduated after completed their courses during summer 2011. The theme for the commencement exercises was "Confronting Challenges and Breaking New Ground". In keeping with this theme, Interim President Ringlen said in his welcoming remarks that the "college will be taking a close look at the impact of instructional priorities on its physical infrastructure... [and] the current structure" of the College in light of potential revenue for the College. "The college will have also take into account JEMCO resolutions has reduced the funding available to the college by \$2.8 million over four years from the compact's Education Sector Grant and the freeze on infrastructure Development Plan funding until 2016," he said. Interim President Ringlen also commented that "the most important issues to be addressed revolve around improving student learning, graduation and placement rates and the broader issue of long term sustainability of higher education in the FSM." The College was also pleased to have welcomed His Excellency, President Emanuel Mori of the FSM as the commencement speaker. In his commencement remarks, President Mori congratulated the graduates and gave them words of advice on how to improve on what they have learned through the College of Micronesia-FSM. The FSM president also commented that the reduction of funding to the college will have

"detrimental effects on the future operation of the college." However, he also believes that "the college can still make it with or without the \$700,000," he said. President Mori further lamented that "millions of dollars have been expended to run the College and yet the manpower need of the nation is far from being met. The nation cannot continue to pour millions of dollars into the College without demanding in return for disciplined and productive workforce to sustain growth in the nation's economy," he said. The President challenged the graduates to be the disciplined and productive workforce that the nation needs. Seventeen graduates under the University of Guam and the College of Micronesia-FSM Partnership Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education Program took part in the commencement exercises. For the first time, the UOG President, Dr Robert Underwood, took part in the celebration to accept the new graduates and present them their diplomas. From among the COM-FSM graduates, the valedictorian was Christlynn Mary Sappa from Chuuk and the salutatorian was Neelma Pearl Skilling from Kosrae. The 54th Commencement Exercises was attend by more than 400 people including Pohnpei traditional leaders, state and national government leaders, members of the diplomatic corps, parents, students and friends of the College.

A letter was sent to President Mori requesting for the generators and the National Campus water improvement project. **Interim President Visits Chuuk and Yap Camus** Interim President Ringlen P Ringlen conducted site visits to Yap, Chuuk, Pohnpei and FSM-FMI campuses last November 2011. The interim president took a tour of all the facilities to ensure that all maintenance challenges are resolved. According to Interim President Ringlen, a two-member team was dispatched to Chuuk and Yap to address those concerns at Chuuk and FSM-FMI campuses. The Interim President also met with external stakeholders from Yap, Chuuk, and Pohnpei to share and update them on the status of the college. The stakeholders were very supportive of the college in terms of expressing their dissatisfaction

and disappointment on the JEMCO resolutions to cut operational funding. DCR, IT and IRP Continue Work on Communication Improvement Recommendations

DCR, IT and IRP staff met on December 09, 2011, at the National Campus and evaluated a plan to strategize on recommendations to improve the college's information communications management. The three objectives for the plan include the following:

- Establish a COM-FSM Brand with a clear audience and objectives;
- Reconsider the design/ content of the COM-FSM Web site for better usability and accessibility; and
- Portray a correct image of the college by developing a plan to distribute COM-FSM information in other mediums.

Several implementation strategies were recommended and some of them were already completed. The College has identified February 2012 as the timeline for implementing all the improvement strategies. The current plan will be presented to the Planning and Resources Committee for their review and final submission to the office of the President for his authorization before implementation. The work is done in response to improvement recommendations by accreditation consultant Mr Floyd Takeuchi.

News & Information Board Names Dr Joseph M Daisy as New President

The Board of Regents for the College of Micronesia-FSM announced it has successfully completed the search process for the position of president, which has been vacant since former president, Spensin James, stepped down in March. After an intense search, Chairman Kasio E Mida reported that Dr Joseph M Daisy has accepted the position and will officially begin the first week of February 2012. Dr Daisy comes from Cambridge College in Cambridge, Massachusetts, where he served since 2005 in a wide range of administrative and leadership positions, including most recently as the Executive Vice President. In 2001, Dr Daisy was engaged by the college as a senior faculty member in the School of Education, teaching courses in leadership and social science research. During his tenure at Cambridge College, he acted in a provost equivalent role and provided academic and administrative leadership for the college for eight months during their search for a new president. Dr Daisy has a strong background in

accreditation, curriculum development, and strategic planning and implementation. With the numerous challenges currently facing the college, great expectations await Dr Daisy. In accepting the position, Dr. Daisy wrote that it is with "great anticipation and pride that I look forward to serving the College as its next President."

Improving Communication Through Sharing of Information

Besides the cultures of evidence and accreditation that the College must have as a continuously improving institution of higher learning, we must also maintain a culture of communication. This means both internal and external communications. For our use, we currently maintain a newsletter and a website to disseminate information within and outside of the college community. The Development & Community Relations (DCR) office is tasked with providing the information that goes on these two communication tools. However, the DCR will need continuous information sharing from the college community in order to provide the content for these publications. *The Interim President is* requiring all departments, operations, offices, divisions or activity heads to update the DCR on their activities. As a general practice, you may send in a bullet list answering the 5 Ws and H for each of your activities to the DCR.

Possible Four Paragraph News Story Template

This is a template that contributors can use to develop news stories from the various campuses for inclusion in the COM-FSM web site and other publications. As much as possible, stories should be written in the perspective of the contributing campus. This kind of news writing is focused mostly on facts and not style of writing. Keep it simple and sweet (KISS)

FIRST PARAGRAPH:

The lead paragraph and the most critical paragraph in the story. It should include the gist of the story – almost always the "who" or "what" of the story. Typical length – two or three sentences. If a reader only reads the lead paragraph, he or she should understand the main point of the story.

SECOND PARAGRAPH:

Often the "quote" paragraph. Have a key quote, or quotes, from the primary "who" in the story about the main element in the story. Typical length: two or three sentences.

THIRD PARAGRAPH

Use this paragraph to expand focusing on the other "W" elements: "when," "where," "why." And perhaps the "how." Typical length: two or three sentences.

FOURTH PARAGRAPH

This paragraph can be used to expand on the third paragraph, or add other points of view. The other points of view could be a new quote from another participant, clearly identified and whose relationship to the story is clear. Typical length: two or three sentences.
