It was a gathering of busy people - business owners, managers, directors, supervisors, even CEO's and CFO's. They came by invitation of the College of Micronesia-FSM, whose message to them was clear: "We are here to listen to you." The reactivation of the BAC is an initiative of the Business Administration Division of COM-FSM. The council's purpose is to promote a partnership between local businesses/ employers and the college, in line with its goal to establish a services network for community, workforce, and economic development.

our students so that they can be meaningful participants in the political, social, and economic life of the FSM. And when we lost our way, we lost our connection with all of you." President Daisy expressed optimism and hopes about the future of the college and that of the FSM as he looked around and noted the presence of very important people of various expertise and discipline, who came to the meeting despite their busy schedules. He said that as the college looks forward to the celebration of it's 20th anniversary in 2013, he wanted to renew COM-FSM's commitment to collaboration and accountability to all, most especially to the students.

Inputs from the Business Sector

During the one-hour consultative forum that followed, business sector representatives took turns in offering suggestions, asking questions, seeking clarifications, expressing their observations and expectations about COM-FSM graduates, and volunteering

the various resources and assistance available from their respective organizations that the college can tap into for the benefit of students. Among the examples cited were providing guest lecturers, on-the-job trainings, and internship opportunities, which the division plans to incorporate in a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the advisory council members and the college. Initial discussions focused on the need of most establishments for accounting graduates and local certified public accountants. Subsequent talks emphasized the importance of requiring students to do practical work before graduating. There were inquiries about the possibility of the college offering evening classes and introducing other programs such as those in the field of retail management and aviation, and suggestions about training students on the use of accounting software packages to better prepare them for work in the

real world. Failure of some graduates to communicate well during job interviews, as well as their apparent lack of self-confidence and clear sense of purpose, were among the weaknesses observed by many employers. They asked the college to do something about it to help improve the graduates' chances of getting employed.

Successful Event

The ACCJC has received a Lumina Foundation grant award to implement a 30-month project exploring the Degree Qualifications Profile as a framework for developing or strengthening institutions' degree learning outcomes and programmatic assessments. Converting Classification System from Dewey to LC

The College of Micronesia-FSM started converting its library collection at Kosrae Campus Library from the Dewey Decimal system to the Library of Congress system. The conversion will bring Kosrae Campus library to the same classification system used by the other campus libraries. Though the conversion is not complete, a significant volume of the collection is already converted. According to Kosrae LRC technician, LRC patrons should not encounter any problems using the LC system since the two classification systems are similar. The LRC Technician will be available to provide group or individual orientations for patrons needing assistance understanding the LC call numbers.

College Continues Fire Drills at National Campus

The College of Micronesia-FSM is continuing a series of fire drills at the National Campus to test its Emergency and Disaster Preparedness Plan. According to Chief of Security Warren Ching, they have completed drills at the residence halls, dining hall and at the Administration Building. They are currently preparing for fire drills at the Learning Resources Center, faculty office buildings and the classrooms. Briefings were conducted before each drill to update building occupants of the procedures involved in the drills. "The occupants need to know who the building and floor wardens are and their responsibilities. Next time we can have one that is unannounced," commented Chief Ching.

Chuuk Campus Organizes Health Fair for Students

The College of Micronesia-FSM Chuuk Campus organized a Health Fair for the campus community on October 23rd from 11:00 am – 12:30 pm.

The theme for the fair was "Be Healthy and Go Local." The event was celebrated around a campus clean up competition among student groups representing the different regions of Chuuk. As well, student groups showcased fruits and vegetables from their regions. At the end of the competitions, the first prize was issued to the Northern Namoneas Region, second prize to North West Region, third prize went to Southern Namoneas Region, and the fourth prize went to Faichuuk Region.

Chuuk Campus Devoted A Saturday For Training

Chuuk Campus faculty and staff made a commitment to complete detailed accreditation training on Saturday, October 20, 2012. Faculty met from 8:30 am - 12:30 pm to learn more about the accreditation process, their specific roles and responsibilities as faculty in this process, and their important role this year towards ensuring evidence of proficiency level on our ACCJC/WASC Student Learning Outcomes Rubric. Faculty also made a commitment to work together in teams to conduct peer assessments on authentic assessment strategies for the fall 2012 semester. From 12:30 pm – 1:00 pm both faculty and staff conducted a communications exercise together, making everyone aware that each office and area of the college communicates in a slightly different language and jargon. We have to be cognizant when we communicate with others across the college, and to our external community, of the additional efforts necessary to ensure effective, clear communications. Staff continued training on the accreditation process all afternoon. The Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness and Quality Assurance (VPIEQA), Frankie Harriss, was impressed with the positive energy and clear commitment by Chuuk Campus towards assuming their portion of work necessary to move COM-FSM to where it needs to be, and to remain, as a quality institution of higher

education. She noted, "most employees would likely not be too thrilled to give up a Saturday to sit through training, but everyone exhibited an attitude that this training was important and that they were dedicated – it was fantastic. and I greatly appreciated the hard work." Excellent questions were asked throughout the day, showing this campus is taking initiatives, under Campus Dean Kind Kanto, to do their part to be both knowledgeable and proactive in the accreditation process. The majority of faculty and staff at Chuuk campus have completed the online Accreditation Basics Course (including completion by Regent Graceful Enlet), and they are striving for 100% completion presently second only to Yap campus for completion rates. Additionally, the faculty are meeting each month to improve upon their assessment processes and skills.
