- Conducted testing of how to dry fish for local feed production.
- Provided technical information and advice to four individuals planning to apply for the Farmer/Rancher Grant this year.
- Provided technical information to a local producer of coconut oil in grinding copra and extracting coconut milk, the process currently being used in processing fresh copra for chicken and pig feed
- Provided technical assistance to 13 individuals and the Yap State Division of Agriculture in the importation and care of day old chicks of 22 specialty breeds.
- Conducted survey of small chicken farmers in Yap. Results were: There are currently 11 small family production units ranging from 4 to 21 chickens per family (average of 11 chickens) producing a range of 3-19 eggs per day. 8 farmers sell their eggs at a price range of \$3.75 to \$4.20 per dozen and/or \$0.40 to 0.50 per fresh or boiled egg earning extra income

Kosrae

The KAES worked on three research and extension projects.

Collected germplasm of different varieties of swamp taro, soft taro and sweet potato.

2,200 cultures of sweet potato, swamp taro and soft taro were sub-cultured on multiplication media or transferred on screening media.

Distributed seedlings and extension materials.

Organized farm visits for on-site recommendations, technical assistance and support.

Acclimatized tissue-cultured plantlets.

1,300 taro and 560 sweet potato seedlings were produced, and 300 taro and 200 sweet potato plants were distributed.

900 vegetable seedlings were produced, and 150 seedlings were distributed.

Kosrae CES;

Entrepreneurship Trainings:

- Five club members that participated in the sewing training in the fall of 2012 were admitted to the Youth Entrepreneurship Start-Up (YES).program designed to assist trainees in starting up a business. Each participant was given a chance to loan the each sewing machine as a trial to apply knowledge and skills trained on. After six months, all returned the sewing machines with positive report on their new experience. These are first time sewing machine users and first business experience. The six months period was up in January of 2013 and all machines were returned with good condition.
- Follow-up meeting with carving club members during the month of February:
 - carving is continuing in preparation of the State Agriculture and Cultural Fair in May 2013
 - 2. One member is doing wood carving
 - 3. One member is doing ornamental carving with necklace

	• Recruitment: recruited 8 youth to participate in the sewing training in March 2013. Recruited 10 youth to participate in the carving skill and three families to home gardening program.
	• Food Processing Program: CRE Coordinator presented basic techniques of food processing. Coordinator presented three lessons on Principles of Food Processing and one cooking demonstration on taro pancake to AG 090 course to nineteen students and the Ag instructor.
	• Nutrition Program: The survey of 238 young mothers and two young fathers took place on 2/11-15/13. Parents were advised to use more locally grown food rather than the imported.
	• EFNEP staff was invited to a panel discussion which was aired prior to the International Women's Day.
	 Home Gardening Program: Continued and maintained seedling production at CES nursery. Sowed Chinese cabbage, bell pepper and cucumber. In addition to container garden method, 2 clients have created other techniques like tree trunks and locally woven baskets as containers for planting cabbages.
