## **EN205      Literature of the Sea**

### **I.      LEARNING OUTCOMES**

#### **Program Learning Outcomes, Humanities:**

Students will be able to demonstrate an ability for independent thought and expression in at least one of the following areas: the arts, ethical thought and moral values, historical analysis, language, or **literature**.

#### **General Learning Outcomes:**

1. *Literary Awareness*: Students will be able to define and identify the basic literary genres of narrative fiction and non-fiction, drama, and poetry. Students will also be able to define and analyze literary elements within the literature they examine, using basic literary terminology, and reproduce these elements in the literature they create.
2. *Cultural Awareness*: Students will be able to describe the ways in which cultural circumstances and values are reflected in the literature they examine and create.
3. *Historical Awareness*: Students will be able to explain how the historical background in which this literature was created impacts the literature.
4. *Thematic Awareness*: Students will be able to discuss the ways in which the themes and patterns of literature of the sea can provide insights into human experience, with an emphasis upon the Pacific experience.
5. *Communication*: Students will be able to communicate effectively their analyses, interpretations and critiques in group discussions about nautical literature across multiple genres.
6. *Writing*: Students will be able to produce compositions on specific aspects of nautical texts (including essay tests and a formal research essay), and to produce writing about the sea themselves (in the forms of poetry, plays, fiction and non-fiction).
7. *Research*: The students will be able to conduct library and online research to support written assignments about nautical literature – with an emphasis upon the Pacific.

## **Specific Learning Outcomes**

1. *Literary Awareness:* Students will be able to
  - 1.1 identify and discuss basic elements of narrative fiction: including but not limited to plot, character, setting, point of view, tone, mood, theme.
  - 1.2 identify and discuss elements of poetry: including but not limited to form, meter, figurative language, setting, sound effects.
  - 1.3 identify and discuss basic elements of drama: including, but not limited to, structure, characterization, language, setting, plot, tone, spectacle and phenomenological envelope
  - 1.4 identify and discuss basic elements of rhetorical patterning: including but not limited to chronology, explanation and definition
2. *Cultural Awareness:* Students will be able to
  - 2.1 identify relationships between the various pieces of literature studied and their cultural settings.
  - 2.2 discern the specific elements within a story, play, poem or expository piece that reflect the values of a culture.
3. *Historical Awareness:* Students will be able to
  - 3.1 identify the historical period during which the play, poem, short story, novel or non-fiction piece originated.
  - 3.2 describe the significance of the historical context of each piece examined.
4. *Thematic Awareness:* Students will be able to
  - 4.1 identify common themes found across multiple genres in literature of the sea.
  - 4.2 identify pieces which exhibit similar themes.
  - 4.3 analyze similarities and differences between and among poems, short stories, novels, plays and expository travelogues with similar themes.
  - 4.4 analyze poems, fictional and non-fictional narratives and plays about the sea and compare or contrast the themes within them to the student's personal experiences of the sea.

5. *Communication*: Students will be able to
  - 5.1 state an opinion/argument and contribute supporting evidence relevant to the topic under discussion.
- 6.. *Writing*: Students will be able to
  - 6.1 produce a short play, several poems, short stories and non-fictional pieces about the sea.
  - 6.2 employ expository writing to explicate, analyze or persuade.
  - 6.3 produce a short (3-5 pages) documented research paper on a stated topic related to an aspect of literature of the sea.
7. *Research*: Students will be able to
  - 7.1 research a specific literary topic, conduct online and library research to support and produce a short research paper

## **II. COURSE CONTENT:**

Because the course covers four genres of literature, it can be divided into four parts, each part of which covers a specific genre discretely. At the instructor's discretion it may also be organized in a way that the four genres are covered together throughout the course. However the course is structured, it should deal with the four genres relatively equally. Creative writing seminars and assignments will be conducted along side and will spring out of the four genres being examined.

The course will consist of a close examination of one short novel and several short stories. For extra credit the students may elect to read a longer novel. Two plays will be analyzed, as will two pieces of non-fiction and several poems. Each will be examined for structural elements, the writer's voice and point of view, language choices, characterization within the pieces (including the treatment of the sea as a character), rhythmic elements, tone, mood and setting. Students will employ some of the literary elements they encounter on the page in creating their own literature of the sea.
