- The BOR will review all existing policies by 2016 in accordance with the BOR approved <u>Communications Policy</u>.
- COM-FSM will ensure all policies are placed in a standardized format, with the COM-FSM logo and requisite components as stipulated in the <u>Communications Policy</u> and the Strengthening Purposeful Dialogue: A Handbook of Guiding Principles, Protocols, and Strategies.
- COM-FSM will ensure all policies are organized and located in a central location on the college website, accessible to all stakeholders to whom they apply, in accordance with the <u>Communications Policy</u> goals.
